

FLOOD RELIEF REPORT, 19 December 2010.



Flood assessment

The 2010 Pakistan floods, in all four provinces of the country, affected the Indus River basin. At one point, roughly one-fifth of Pakistan's total area was underwater. According to an estimate, the floods have directly affected over 20 million people. Therefore, the number of individuals affected by the flooding exceeds the combined total of affected people by the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami, the 2005 Kashmir earthquake and the 2010 Haiti earthquake. The government officials have stated the total economic impact of the floods as 43 billion USD.



By giving priority to human security and to reach out to the victims of floods in the remote areas of the country, the South Asia Centre for Peace (SACP) approached Al-Ghaffar Welfare &

Education Society in Khan Pur to initially prepare a flood report of district Raheem Yar Khan (Table 1).

Relief work

Recently, in an effort to aid in the ongoing relief work for flood victims, the SACP provided more than 300 good quality jerseys to the entire population of Basti Ahmed Kudun, Basti Ahmed Kudun 1, Basti Hijazi & Ghulam Hussain, Basti Hijazi & Ghulam Hussain 1 in district Raheem Yar Khan, Punjab. These villages were badly affected by the recent floods in Pakistan. It is to be mentioned that **216 jerseys (PKR 75,000)** were provided through the funds of SACP and the rest of them through local donations arranged by the local partner: Al-Ghaffar Welfare & Education Society (Khan Pur). Mr. Khawaja Muhammad Idrees, District Education Coordinator for the Punjab Chief Minister was invited to distribute jerseys among the victims of floods.
