A Journey From Poverty to the Wealth of Hope



How many times have we walked passed street kids and wondered what the future holds for them? It can't be easy for such a child to have a positive vision of the future and have the courage to rise above his/her situation. Geduld Veldsman recently told me his

heart-touching childhood story and I would like to share it with all of you. He grew up in Paarl, a small town close to Cape Town, South Africa. His parents were very poor and couldn't afford to take care of him, so they decided to give him away at the age of 13. This unfortunate event led him to live on the streets, but unlike many children in a similar situation who get caught up in crime, gangs, drugs, alcohol abuse and who have lost all hope in life, Geduld (which in Afrikaans means "patience") believed that someone "up there" liked him and that when one door closes, God will always open another one for you. While he was living on the streets together with three of his friends, he always prayed to the Lord to keep him safe so that one day he could tell other kids that there is hope for even the poorest of the poor. He continued going to school despite the hardships in his life and managed to graduate. At the age of 17 he left the streets and started living in a tent on the grounds of a church and helped the Pastor with the ministry. One day, as the Pastor was busy giving a sermon, Geduld felt an inner voice telling him: "This is your time... ". That was the best day of his life, he told me.

His faith in God, positive attitude towards life and hope for a better future have manifested wonders in his life. He received a loan from people who trusted and believed in him, giving him the opportunity to study further. In 2008, at the age of 25, Geduld started working

Meditation Brings Peace to Rural Pakistan



Ashfaque Hussain, our Chapter Leader in Sukkur, Pakistan attended his first WSYC gathering held in Thailand at the Dhammakaya Foundation in 2008. Ashfaque and other WSYC members participated in a 4-day event called "The Middle Way Meditation Retreat", where they learned Buddhist leadership and Peace-building skills through a special meditation practice that took them to find inner Peace, Joy and Happiness. This Buddhist meditation technique was well accepted by all participants from different religious and cultural backgrounds. On his return to Pakistan,

Ashfaque was inspired to share what he had learned with the people in his community. Many of them suffered from frustration due to their jobs, traffic noise, environmental issues, etc. These factors led to family quarrels, home violence and low productivity at work. After teaching and facilitating a group of 20 people for one month, many noticed a positive change in their lives as they started focusing more on resolving issues rather than complaining about them. Their productivity and relations at work improved considerably; they started sleeping better and even changed their eating habits. Many became more tolerant with their family members and some wives even called Ashfague in amazement and wondered what kind of magic spell he had cast on their husbands! The impact of daily meditation in the lives of ordinary people was so noticeable that their family members and friends were inspired to also learn and practice it together at home. This touching story shows that external Peace can only manifest when we find true Peace within ourselves.

you bring inspired youth together! On March 9th, youth from 6 African nations came together to dialogue about their spiritual journeys and moving their spirituality in to the realm of action. The WSYC

gathering was organized by Lawrence Yealue and Samue K. Fianko, who are both active leaders with COE. Youth spoke eloquently of their lifelong sense of being different and their gratitude to find those who shared a sense of the deeper meaning of life. Many spoke of the burning desire to move past good words to spirituality in action. Little did we know at the beginning of our time together that specific actions would emerge before our eyes!

Dr. Harriett Nettles, a longtime elder with COE, travelled to the conference from Liberia, where she lectures on issues of peace and conflict resolution. In a miraculous bit of synchronicity, after Harriett expressed her deep concern over the recent riot in northern Liberia over ethnic/religious issues, one of the participants shared that his two parents are from each of the two tribes in conflict. In Fofee Kamara's own family, the Muslim side had refused to accept his sister when she decided to follow her mother's Christian heritage. Fofee threatened to leave the family altogether if his sister was not accepted and thus brought about reconciliation. He and Harriett are now planning to travel to North Liberia together to offer interfaith dialogue and hopefully bring the two sides together. A long conversation ensued about how the WSYC hub could alleviate the greater Muslim/Christian crisis in West Africa. We realized that we possessed a great capacity to work together while being guided by our deep spiritual centers. The capacity to act from a deep spiritual center alongside those who share our sense of concern was recognized as our greatest strength as we collectively move forward as part of the larger global family.
